



If you answered "No," why not? (Some schools have shifted away from this practice for a variety of reasons while other schools still find the process useful).

- We do have one, but had "paused" it while we articulated the purpose of having a written curriculum in the first place, along side our first go at defining Mission-aligned learning principles. This resulted in a shift to adopting external sets of standards for each subject area instead of teachers coming up with theme each time the cycle hit their subject area. In other words, teachers don't write curriculum anymore at our school, they use it to design learning.
- We are developing this process now
- We moved away for a few years, and have now reintroduced one with more flexibility.
- There had tried a new procedure the year prior to my arrival called 'Hexagons.' Based on feedback, this was discontinued.
- We have ongoing curriculum review on our three programs and most of this results from reflections made at the end of the unit of inquiry. Most subject teams have a curriculum review process which takes place at the end of the year but this focuses primarily on the units being taught, their order etc. It is not a whole school process which looks at alignment across the entire school/all three IB programs.
- I am new but from what I gather there was never a process in place! It is now in the strategic plan so at least plans are in place for it to occur!
- We review on an ongoing basis. When depts find the standards are no longer working, or when new standards come out, we go through a review, but it is not on a regular cycle. As and when the need arises.
- It happens informally tends to happen when a new head of section takes over
