


TOPIC:	High School Teaching Load

Thank you all for sharing your information with me. As you can see, there are basically one-third of us with 75%, one-third with 62.5% and the other third is some mixtures in the range of 50% to 80%. Also, those schools with Department Heads had a time release of about 10% to 20%.

If you answered yes to any of the above, briefly explain how it is applied. We have a complicated formula taking into account # of preps and # of students to add stipends to teachers	
Heads of Dept get a 15% release time (3hrs) and a stipend	
Department Head teaches one class less (usually 4 instead of 5) Heads of Department have up to five additional non-contact periods in every six day cycle. This is roughly the same as one less class.	
HOD's get two periods (110 minutes of release time) a week	
Number of preps is an issue at our school, since most teachers have 5 preps. We also do not separate SL/HL kids, so they are in the same classes. Also, language classes are combined by grade levels (7-8, 9-10). All of this makes an incredibly heavy load, which is the hardest part of our high school.	. Also, language
