Which MAP tests do you administer?

- 48 Schools test Math and Reading (92%)
- 34 Schools test Language (65%)
- 5 Schools test Science (10%)
- 4 Schools don't use MAP

How often to you test?

- 42 Schools test Fall and Spring (81%)
- 6 Schools test Fall, Winter, and Spring (11%)
- 2 Schools test only Spring
- 1 School tests only Fall

How much time do you allot for each test?

Most common amount of time allotted is 90 minutes (especially for Math and Reading, Language sometimes less)

- Math 90 min; Reading 90 min;
- typically and on average 90 minutes
- 90 for both Reading and Math
- All tests 110 min
- 80 Minutes (1 full period)
- ES- 60 minutes each; MS- 80 minutes each
- 80 minutes
- 90 mins for G9, 80 mins for grades below
- 75-90 minutes depending on division. We also provide additional time on 'make-up' days for students who were absent or not able to complete the test in the allotted time
- We allow students to take the time they need while attempting to keep them within reasonably long testing blocks. Reading and Math testing time averages are about 90 -110 minutes. Language testing time average is about 45 - 60 minutes.
- 1 hour blocks but many children require more time to finish
- 70 min for each test in MS and HS. 90 Min for each test in ES
- Varies - but is time limited so doesn't run over as you suggested with your MAP testing.
- Varies by division: we recommend a 2 hour block set aside for testing to each division, but often it is less. The leadership in each division (ES/MS/HS) make the final decision.
- In Elementary: 90 minutes for each test. In Secondary: 120 minutes for each test.
- As long as children need, typically ranges from 30 - 60 minutes depending on age.
- we schedule one period but the students can take as long as they like
- See below
- 80 per test
- 80 minutes each, follow up if needed.

- 85 minutes for all (one block in our schedule)
- CTP is a timed test
- 85
- 80 minutes for each
- As long as the student is being productive.
- We do not give a time limit.
- 40 - 60 minutes
- About 40 minutes to an hour
- 1 hour per test
- We have left it open for kids to take the time they needed but we are looking at moving to prescribed times
- 80 minutes each
- unlimited
- each test gets one block = 80min
- 80 each, but students may continue later if needed
- Depends on level - average - Math 65, Reading 65, LU 50
- They are all timed
- Es- 60 mins. MS/HS- 75mins (1block)
- as much time as students need to finish
- 90 min for each test and as much extra time as each student needs.
- 90 mins, with extra time if needed
- 90 min math, 90 min reading
- 60 minutes
- 90 Minutes Math / 90 Minutes Reading / 75 Minutes Lang. / 60 Minutes Science
- 60 minutes for both with time to finish at a later date if needed
- about 90 mins. Those who finish early are asked to read their independent book
- Unlimited per student, but usually they can finish in one period (45 minutes)
- The tests are given in 55 minute periods. Students who do not complete the test during the 55 minute period are given a chance to do so during a make-up session. We do not give a limit to the time needed for testing.
- roughly 75-90 minutes, but no strict time limits are imposed
- We allot 90 minutes for each test, but no time-limit. The shorter Language test does mean that we can conduct make-ups for the vast majority of the students, though not all. We conduct make-up sessions the over two days starting before school and cutting into advisory, but not too much missed class.
- Math - 90, Reading - 90, Language - 90
- All tests 85 minutes, however (as has been suggested), students seem to be taking longer and longer to complete and the need to call back groups of students to finish up is increasing. It is a huge time investment, to be sure.
- no time limit, but normally we allot 80 minutes
